





New Plantings

My new potato bags arrived today. I've never grown potato's this way before, but you put dirt in the bag, put the seed potatoes in, and then let them grow. I always dug long furrows and mounds, planting the seed potatoes and filling in the furrows as they grow. It is a little more labor intensive, but it has always helped me feel more connected to the garden.

This year will be different. They will grow in bags. As we have in each place we've moved, we need to adjust our gardening to the location. Sometimes we've had a lot of space where we can plant a large garden plus have plants in containers. Other times we've had only space for a few plants on the porch. In each place, we've had to decide how best to use the space we have.

While gardening connects me to the ground, it also connects me to the generations who taught me gardening. Grandparents and parents who had large gardens and fruit trees and other plants showed me the joy of growing the food we eat. Part of their legacy is the gardens we grow.

And yet, we can't do it the way they did. Aside from a few years in Fairbanks, none of our parents or grandparents ever gardened in Alaska. The climate and soil and seasons were totally different. And yet the principals are similar. Our connection to the land may be different, but work still gives us food.



As I think about our gardening, I'm reminded how much these truths are reflected in other areas of life. As we learn new ways of doing things and expand our understanding of creation, our approach to life shifts. We can't always do things the way we've always done them. Yet, we learn and are enriched by the experiences, lives and histories of those who have gone before.

Every year as I prepare to garden, I realize how much has changed in just a year. I also see how much is the same. As we work through our lives together at Anchor Park, we sometime may get the sense that everything is always changing. When we dwell on the changes and miss the things that are common with the past, we tend to worry. When we only focus on the changes and ignore those common connections, we tend to become unrooted.

We need to celebrate who we have been, who has gone before, and how they inform who we are. But we also need to grasp the calling to engage the world around us in new and exciting ways. We build on the past while moving forward.

I am happy to announce that Alaska Native HOPE will be hosting "We Are More! (than the missionaries said we could be)." Due to potential funding schedules, the start date will now begin in July. We will host a panel of faith leaders that will share what they know about their institutions' participation and compliance in relationship with United States policies that led to the forced assimilation of Alaska Native people.

t is important that we do this because many institutions, like the United Methodist Church, have made beautiful statements that have acknowledged their participation and made steps toward healing and empowerment, but most Alaska Native people are not aware that any church has taken these steps. Anchor park will then host a training for Triumph Over Trauma healing circles (April 13) that will then take place at APU over the course of 4 months.

In October, we will host a listening summit that will offer a chance for survivors and descendants to share the truth of their experiences with church members that are committed to supporting further work of empowerment and healing. I welcome your prayers and support during this process. If anyone is interested in helping as a trauma healing circle facilitator or as a faith witness, please reach out to me. Happy Easter!
